

In addition to increasing the number of stations, the Committee noted that a stakeholder requested that the charging stations include theft deterrence to prevent theft of charging cables. At the October 25 Public Safety, Housing & Transportation Committee meeting, LADWP told us: Most of the opportunities that we are anticipating involve private infrastructure and that's the vast majority of the infrastructure that LADWP tries to build in the City. LADWP's Electric Transportation Programs Team runs a rebate program and they've been authorized by their Board to offer up to \$40 million per year. That's probably the best place where we want to start and the role that the RVNC could have is in connecting to LADPW the owners of those properties that we've identified or whoever is paying the electrical bill there. They would be the ones who would apply for LADWP's rebate. The way the program works is there is a space for the owners to say they will assign the rebate over to a third-party. There are multiple companies in Los Angeles that will prepare a design and they'll say if you assign the rebate over to them then they'll install the charging stations free of charge to

LADBS Inspector Da Liu informed Philip on January 26 that the City Attorney's Office held a hearing on January 10 at which the property owner and his attorney were instructed to obtain permits and approval if they want to change the use and they were given until February 10 to correct the illegal construction and occupancy. Furthermore, on February 10, the owner's agent informed us that their tenant will vacate the space as of March 1, 2023.

At the November 15 General Board meeting, Ronee said the RVNC should file a community impact statement and then notify the Budget Advocates of the Council File number. Philip subsequently checked the Council File Management System and identified Council File 13-1384 (please see the following https://cityclerk.lacity.org/lacityclerkconnect/index.cfm?fa=ccfi.viewrecord&cfnumber=1 3-1384). This Council File was subsequently closed on August 19, 2016, in Council File 14-0600-S24 (please see the following https://cityclerk.lacity.org/lacityclerkconnect/index.cfm?fa=ccfi.viewrecord&cfnumber=1 4-0600-S24).

Marites Cunanan at LAHD explained to Philip that the Letter of Determination for a land use project (mixed-income development) indicates the number of affordable units and requires the applicant to submit a recorded covenant to LAHD for those affordable units under the Density Bonus Ordinance (LAMC 12.22.A25). We also received the list from City Planning and a list of projects from LADBS on new housing units permitted. Based on a comparison of those three lists, we've asked LAHD to clarify the status of six projects which appear to have received building permits without recording covenants. The City of Los Angeles hereby includes in its 2023-2024 State Legislative Program, Sponsorship of legislation that would amend the Ralph M. Brown Act to allow local legal legislative bodies, including appointed boards, commissions, advisory bodies, and Neighborhood Councils, to continue to conduct most meetings virtually in the absence of any special circumstances, subject to appropriate safeguards to ensure full and robust opportunities for public participation, including by persons who lack means of digital access.
- 22. Discussion and possible action regarding agendizing for the February 21, 2023 General Board meeting DONE's request that NC Boards take action on the continuance of their Zoom license before May 2023 when the licenses expire.
- 23. In 2019 the RVNC submitted a community impact statement supporting the Los Angeles Alliance for a New Economy's (LAANE's) Fair Work Week policy. In December this policy was unanimously voted in by the LA City Council. LAANE's campaign is also broaching the Kroger merger and how it will impact communities across the nation, specifically in LA.

GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT ON NON AGENDA ITEMS

Comments from the public on other matters not appearing on the agenda that are within the Board's jurisdiction will be heard during the General Public Comment period. Please note that under the Brown Act, the Board is prevented from acting on a matter that you bring to its attention during the General Public Comment period; however, the issue raised by a member of the public may become the subject of a future Board meeting. Public comment is limited to two minutes per speaker, unless adjusted by the presiding officer of the Board.

AB 361 Updates -

Public comment cannot be required to be submitted in advance of the meeting, only real-time public comment is required. If there are any broadcasting interruptions that prevent the public from observing or hearing the meeting, the meeting must be recessed or adjourned. If members of the public are unable to provide public comment or be heard due to issues within the Neighborhood Council's control, the meeting must be recessed or adjourned.

Notice to Paid Representatives -

If you are compensated to monitor, attend, or speak at this meeting, City law may require you to register as a lobbyist and report your activity. See Los Angeles Municipal Code Section 48.01 et seq.
