IN CONFORMITY WITH THE JANUARY 1, 2026 ENACTMENT OF CALIFORNIA SENATE BILL 707 (DURAZO) AND LA CITY COUNCIL FILE 23-1114, THE RAMPART VILLAGE NEIGHBORHOOD COUNCIL MEETING WILL BE CONDUCTED VIRTUALLY.

Every person wishing to address the Board must dial 669.900.6833, and enter 843 9934 5554 and then press # to join the meeting. When prompted by the presiding officer, to provide public input at the Neighborhood Council meeting the public will be requested to dial *9 or use the Raise Hand option, to address the Board on any agenda item before the Board takes an action on an item. Comments from the public on agenda items will be heard only when the respective item is being considered.

Comments from the public on other matters not appearing on the agenda that are within the Board's jurisdiction will be heard during the General Public Comment period. Please note that under the Brown Act, the Board is prevented from acting on a matter that you bring to its attention during the General Public Comment period; however, the issue raised by a member of the public may become the subject of a future Board meeting. Public comment is limited to 2 minutes per speaker, unless adjusted by the presiding officer of the Board.

In the event of a disruption that prevents the eligible legislative body from broadcasting the meeting to members of the public using the call-in option or internet-based service option, or in the event of a disruption within the eligible legislative body's control that prevents members of the public from offering public comments using the call-in option or internet-based service option, the eligible legislative body shall take no further action on items appearing on the meeting agenda until public access to the meeting via the call-in option or internet-based service option is restored. Actions taken on agenda items during a disruption that prevents the eligible legislative body from broadcasting the meeting may be challenged pursuant to Section 54960.1. **California Government Code Section 54953.8(b(3)).**

The legislative body shall not require public comments to be submitted in advance of the meeting and shall provide an opportunity for the public to address the legislative body and offer comments in real time. **California Government Code Section 54953.8(b)(4).**

Notwithstanding Section 54953.3, an individual desiring to provide public comment through the use of an internet website, or other online platform, not under the control of the eligible legislative body, that requires registration to log in to a teleconference may be required to register as required by the third-party internet website or online platform to participate. **California Government Code Section 54953.8(b)(5).**

A legislative body that provides a timed public comment period for each agenda item shall not close the public comment period for the agenda item, or the opportunity to register, pursuant to paragraph (5), to provide public comment until that timed public comment period has elapsed. **California Government Code Section 54953.8(b)(6)(A).**

A legislative body that does not provide a timed public comment period, but takes public comment separately on each agenda item, shall allow a reasonable amount of time per agenda item to allow public members the opportunity to provide public comment, including time for members of the public to register pursuant to paragraph (5), or otherwise be recognized for the purpose of providing public comment.

Discussion and possible action to follow-up on the Central LA virtual community workshop to develop a community-driven action plan to improve walking and biking safety focusing on neighborhood schools of Commonwealth Avenue ES, Frank Del Olmo, and Lafayette Park PC. The SRTS Center City Schools Neighborhood Safety & Climate Resilience Project webpage: <https://ladotlivablestreets.org/projects/center-city-SRTS> includes a [map](#) of project boundaries and street typologies. The "About" section, in the landing page, states the design phase is scheduled from February 2026 to March 2027. Jack Linares, Community Affairs Deputy, Office of Vice President Dr. Rocío Rivas, Board of Education, District 2, is in the process of setting up parent meetings for March among the local LAUSD schools and community partners. We'd appreciate feedback from LADOT as they want to see the names of speakers and the presentation as well as to know whether there are any flyers or one pagers to share with parents. At our February 17 General Board meeting, Laila Molina Laila said she will provide an update regarding the "Safe Routes to School" initiative after she talks to their Planning And Transportation Department about it.

 - 3. Discussion and possible action to recommend that the Executive Committee pursue additional street waste collection receptacles in the RVNC. In his CD 10 report at our February 17 General Board meeting, Alan Antonio said addressing the need for additional waste collection receptacles is something that CD 10 has done in the past, where they add them to certain routes, but that does take folks servicing them so it is a process, but if that's something of interest, then if the RVNC can get some locations together, then he can go back to his office and we can see if we can work something out. They would just need to kind of find the provider to service the trash cans. In her CD 13 report, regarding dog waste bag stations and additional waste receptacles, Laila Molina said that's actually a comment that has been brought up to her by various neighborhoods that she's working on right now. So, she'll tell us what she needs in order to communicate with LA Sanitation about this. It's really just a map of where we would like these receptacles, and so if we want to make a map of our neighborhood council area, and then put maybe dots or circles around where we'd like more receptacles, she can send that over to LA Sanitation, and get them to

submit that for consideration, and get us an update on the possibility of, sending those out.

4. Discussion of initiative of the [Bureau of Street Lighting](#) (BSL). The PPPWLU Committee is taking the lead for the RVNC for this initiative. BSL is currently conducting introductory presentations to share general information about its work and to gather feedback from community members regarding their concerns. They are also looking for opportunities to collaborate on future engagement initiatives.

At our November 18 General Board meeting, Ronee expressed interest in providing a draft community impact statement for our next meeting.

Recently, the [Economic Roundtable](#) released their independent report, highlighting how, for decades, LA's rent control policies have favored landlords at the expense of working families. In a report dated November 1, 2024, the Housing Department presented their [report](#) to City Council. Please see page 16 of the report for a table comparing the current provisions and the proposed amendments to the RSO annual allowable rent increase formula.

Discussion and possible action to recommend approval of a community impact statement regarding Council File [21-1230-S8](#), Citywide Code Amendment (CA) / Environmental Clearance (EIR) / Resident Protections Ordinance (Los Angeles City Planning Commission): Introduced October 17, 2024 and referred to Planning and Land Use Management Committee. Los Angeles City Planning Commission report is relative to the Citywide Code Amendment and Environmental Clearance for the proposed [Resident Protections Ordinance](#).
9. Discussion and possible action to recommend approval of a community impact statement regarding Council File [23-1210](#), Leading Pedestrian Intervals (LPI) / Vision Zero Safety Study / Signal Phasing and Timing / Traffic Violence. Motion passed on January 10, 2024, City Council to INSTRUCT the Department of Transportation to report back, within 120 days, with draft updated guidelines for the use of Leading Pedestrian Intervals (LPI), scramble crosswalks, and NO RIGHT TURN ON RED restrictions, taking into account the appropriateness of longer LPI duration, a more liberal set of criteria for scramble crosswalks, and increased usage of restricting right turns on red to reduce vehicle-pedestrian conflicts.
10. Discussion and possible action to recommend approval of a community impact statement regarding Council File [25-0481](#), Bicycle and Multi Use Paths / Maintenance Responsibility / Department of Public Works / Los Angeles Administrative Code / Amendment. The Council to REQUEST that the City Attorney, in consultation with the Department of Public Works (DPW) and its bureaus, to prepare and present an ordinance amending the Los Angeles Administrative Code to assign the responsibility for maintaining City bicycle and multiuse paths to the Department of Public Works and INSTRUCT the City Administrative Officer, with the cooperation of DPW and the Department of Transportation, to provide recommendations regarding alignment of staffing and funding to provide an adequate level of maintenance for bicycle and multi-use paths, at least equal to that provided to streets and sidewalks.

11. Discussion and possible action to recommend approval of a community impact statement regarding Council File [25-0558](#), Bicycle Lane / Parking Violations / Cameras / Automated Technology / Pilot Program / Hollywood Boulevard / Council District 13. Council to instruct the Department of Transportation to report on the feasibility of implementing a pilot project that would utilize cameras and related technologies for the enforcement of parking violations in bicycle lanes, along Hollywood Boulevard in Council District 13, in accordance with the California Vehicle Code Section 40245.
12. Discussion and possible action to recommend approval of a community impact statement regarding Council File [25-0930](#): Departments of Transportation and City Planning in coordination with Bureau of Street Services and the Bureau of Engineering, to report on options and recommendations that would require bike lanes to provide sufficient width for emergency vehicle access.
